Brooklyn Nets Assistant Coach, Doug Overton and his wife Chanel, were special guests at the camp. Coach Overton led basketball sessions as well as a seminar on player development and player motivation.

“The PeacePlayers Basketball Camp is a great way to promote peace, and develop long lasting friendships between Greek-Cypriot and Turkish-Cypriot youth. The PeacePlayers International – Cyprus Basketball Camp was supported by the US Embassy’s Bicomunal Support Program, the Brooklyn Nets, the Laureus Sport for Good Foundation and AVG Technologies.

During the past month PeacePlayers International – Northern Ireland ran the Belfast Interface Games (B.I.G.) using its experience of bridging divides through basketball and partnering with the governing bodies of the three largest, and traditionally segregated, Irish sports: Ulster Council of Gaelic Athletic Association (GAA), Irish Rugby Football Union (IRFU), and the Irish Football Association (IFA) to lead a series of events and trainings using sport for social change across the city of Belfast. Protestant and Catholic young people participated in the region’s most popular sports together on integrated teams, and the program used proven sport-based techniques to challenge stereotypes, nurture development of positive relationships and empower young leaders to effect positive change in their communities for a more peaceful future.
